Light Weight Aeromaster Build, Part Three

Progress Report by Bryan Swank.

For me, wing construction is always a challenge. It is hard to keep them perfectly straight— and with models, any small discrepancy can have a big impact on flight characteristics. Also, the Aeromaster wings are unusually thin, which adds to the difficulty.

Typically, I build wings using a fixture with aluminum arrows that go through the two holes in the ribs; they provide great alignment. But the Aeromaster wings are swept, which means using arrows is not an option. I had to use a traditional **flat building board**. After a lot of sorting and inspecting I finally found a perfectly straight board at Menards and then placed it on my pool table which is obviously very flat.

On the building board, I drew the wing spar and rib locations, then glued blocks to the board to hold the lower spar flat and in position. I next placed a strip of wood under the rear of the ribs so they were all supported at the same height. The **squared-up ribs were glued to the spars.** Now the trailing edge could be glued to the ribs. After applying the top [balsa] sheeting, I flipped the wing over to apply sheeting to the bottom side.

Sheeting requires hours of sanding and trial fitting before being glued in place. On the bigger pieces, I use a **combination of super glue and 5-minute epoxy** because there is not enough time to apply just glue to all the areas before it sets up. I always find this a nerve-racking step because if you get it just a little out of place, it can be a major tear up to fix. Another challenge is minimizing the amount of super glue that gets on the external surfaces and edges since it is really hard to sand.

Creating and fitting the **ailerons** involves a lot of tedious sanding, measuring and checking. I had only one that required straightening with a twist because of slightly warped wood. I did this by soaking the concave side so that it would expand and then held it in position while blowing warm air with a hair dryer. The process is more of an art than a science and usually requires a few tries to get it right. Proper matching alignment at each end was the goal.

To save weight, I mounted the servos to the sheeting instead of building a structure within the wing. I remembered to include string for pulling servo wires through the ribs after the rest of the sheeting

Prepare for the September Meeting: Read these Minutes

Minutes from the August 6, 2024 Meeting

These minutes composed by President Greg Emerick. The meeting convened at the Jim Murray flying field. Sixteen members attended.

- Pledge of Allegiance
- Motion to accept last month's meeting minutes approved.

Officer Reports

- (Greg Emerick) **President** Opened discussion of two major purchases: the Shade Pavilion (\$2,500) pending final IDEM approval, and a new mower in two years (\$6,000). The consensus by members present was that we are not quite ready to handle both of these expenses and the priority should be on the mower.
- (Rob Weismiller) **Vice President** The IMAC contest typically brings in about \$400-\$500 in registration fees. A motion to direct the registration fees to the club treasury passed. A separate Cheer Fund donation would be made based on free-will offerings at the event.
- (John Vinson) **Treasurer** we are solvent.
- (Mike Bealmear) **Secretary** Called for approval of the recent By-Laws edits; the motion passed. Reported latest details concerning the Jim Murray Field dedication planned for August 8, at 2:30 p.m.
- (Colin Mowery) **Webmaster** Proposed that we save up to \$500/year on web server fees by switching over to a free club Facebook page. For awareness only, we are researching this as a cost saving measure. Bryan Swank knows of a cheaper web service and will share that with Colin. Cynthia also uses a cheaper web service option.
- (Mike Marthaler) **Field Marshall** Will call a work session in October to fill low spots in the runway. Mole traps are in use but can be removed if interfering with flight ops; John can show anyone how to reset the trap if needed.
- (Ken Erickson) **Public Relations & Intro Pilot Program coordinator** Training nights are Thursdays at 6:00 p.m.
- (Mark Dudley) **Safety Coordinator** no safety issues to report.

Events

- (Ken Erickson) The **Fun-Fly** for club members on August 3 went well. Will Emerick won the spot landing contest and Greg Emerick won the Limbo. Henry Erickson won the bomb drop.
- (Rob Weismiller) announced the date for the BCRC IMAC Challenge will be September 20-22nd.
- (Mike Bealmear) For the **Joe Grube Fly-In** on October 6, members voted to spend \$250 on a raffle prize to be either an airplane or an engine. (Motion by Rob Weismiller, seconded by Greg Emerick.) If the event is cancelled for weather, the item can be raffled at the annual club banquet.

Minutes from the August 6, 2024 Meeting continued

Old Business, Past action items:

- (Mike Bealmear) **Shade pavilion project update**. We have approval from BCSWMD to pursue this if the club chooses to move forward. The Board, in turn, must get final approval from IDEM; this is in progress. Two styles are available: a Lean-to and a carport style (like what we have now). \$2,500 would get us a 12 x 20 x 8-foot shade pavilion, installed. [See notes in the President's report; voting on this has been tabled.]
- (John Vinson) presented a plan to paint the **Porta-Potties**. The colors and labeling could be pink/Amelia (Earhart) and blue/Chuck (Yeager). Decision is tabled until the Field Marshall can review and approve.
- (Mike Marthaler) connect with Dave Carothers to see if we can get a sign made up with the latest **AMA Safety Code** for posting at the field bulletin board.
- Dave Carothers has produced a **2**nd **plaque on the memorial**. The names include: Tom Hartman, Jim Sachleben, Dan Patton, and Russ Kuhn.

New Business

- (Greg Emerick) The majority of the executive committee has aligned on a proposal to combine the secretary and treasurer roles. The club by-laws allow the Ex Comm to decide if this should be one or two separate positions. Combining these reduces hand-offs and increases the efficiency of the team. Motion to accept this move passed.
- (John Vinson) Condition of the **GEOTEX runway has deteriorated.** He reports that most of the members at the meeting do not use it. The condition of the GEOTEX has become bad and it is being overtaken with weeds. The club cannot afford to replace it. It would take a lot of effort to clear the weeds and patch it. Is it worthwhile to the club to keep this and who is willing to maintain it? If nobody is willing to maintain it, the club will vote soon on whether to remove it and re-purpose this area as a grass runway. If you use the GEOTEX runway and keeping it is important to you, please send an email to Greg Emerick and Mike Marthaler to make your desires known.
- EAA Youth Program is on Mondays and Wednesdays, 4-6 p.m. at the airport. Check it out!
- A good volunteer opportunity is to help the Cheer Fund (beyond donations) by offering your time to deliver presents.




