RC Foam Board Training Box

An idea from Bryan Swank

The attached pictures are of a flight box for carrying the radios and batteries for our training plane. Since several different instructors will possibly be using the plane, I thought it would be helpful to have a way to keep things like the radios and batteries organized and together. Also, a place for a few tools might be useful.

In a prior project I used the 3/16 foam boards from Hobby Lobby to make a jig to align the wings on a biplane. I was impressed by how stiff it was and how well super glue held the pieces together. So, I thought-- why not give it a try in building a flight box?

This experiment ended up better than I expected. It is super sturdy. All joints are simply butted together and attached with medium super glue. The box was made from one 20"x30" foam board for \$1.99 plus a scrap piece of PVC pipe. That seems like a real bargain! If it wears out, we can just pitch it and for less than \$3 we can make another one.

Who knows? Maybe my next project will be designing and building a plane out of foam board!

From Minutes:



A Workshop That Took 48 Years to Finish


It took me 48 years, but I finally have my workshop in order! As I told you before I usually do my plane projects all over the house. Now the challenge will be to break my old habits.
